Allison Cahill Class of 1999



Allison Cahill was born to play. Pick a game, teach her the rules, andwatch her go. One of the most accomplished athletes to have ever graduated from Uxbridge High School, Allison was a captain, an all-star, a record setter and the Spartanette of the Year in 1999. And the best was yet to come!

Allison was a dynamic shortstop for three years on the softball team, serving as captain in her senior year. She was a key runner for the girls cross country team as a freshman. But it was on the basketball court that Allison's star shined the most. A nimble, quick-witted ball handler and deadly outside shooter, she graduated as the highest scoring basketball player (male or female) in UHS history, with 1446 points, a record that still stands. Allison once put up 42 points (the second highest total ever scored by a UHS hoopster), and one time scored 28 points in a district final, hitting seven three pointers. She was a captain her senior year and a regular on the local all-star teams, including being a two-time *Telegram & Gazette* Super Team selection. A true scholar-athlete, Allison was an asset to every team she was a part of, from her days in

youth sports, to her AAU teams to her varsity squads, earning a total of 8 varsity letters in her four years of high school.

Allison followed that up with four years on the Princeton University Lady Tiger Women's Basketball team, playing guard and earning four varsity letters, serving as team captain her senior year and joining the 1000 point club.

Then things really picked up. Allison's mother Pam tells the story that when Allison was 4 or so, she announced, as she was watching the NFL with her father, that "when I grow up, I am going to be a pro football player." And that's exactly what she did and still does. Now a quarterback in her 21st year of Women's Professional Tackle Football, Allison owns most of the records in the sport. Her teams(Boston Militia, Boston Renegades) have won National Championships. Allison has been the league MVP 6 times. She has been a 14-time all-star, has passed for over 25,000 yards and 350 touchdowns, is the only quarterback with over 100 victories (148-25), and has a career QB rating of 1193. Her signed game jersey was curated by the Pro Football Hall of Fame in Canton, Ohio. Her 2018 football championship season was documented in the film "Born to Play," which aired on ESPN in July of 2021.

Allison currently resides in East Boston with her wife and teammate Whitney. She is a personal trainer for Equinox, a career that is a perfect blend of her love of health and fitness and desire to help others. She looks forward to another championship season.

Emily Cahill Class of 2013



Before the new high school and track were constructed at 300 Quaker Highway in 2012, practice and meets for both the indoor and outdoor track and field squads were adventurous, to say the least, dealing with makeshift conditions. However, no distractions would prevent Emily Cahill from achieving excellence as she set UHS school records in 12 track and field events that remain unbroken ten years later.

Emily has been selected to the UHS Athletic Hall of Fame in her first year of eligibility, having completed one of the most storied track and field careers in school history. She broke and continues to hold school records for high jump (5'7"), 50-yard hurdles (750s), 55-meter hurdles (867s), 55-meter dash (753s), and the 4x200-meter relay for indoor track, as well as high jump (5'6"), triple jump (36'7"), 100-meter dash (1240s), 100-meter hurdles (14.83s), 200-meter dash (26.05s), 4x100-meter relay, and 4x200-meter relay for outdoor track. For four years straight, she captured the Indoor Division Four State Championship title in high jump. Emily is the all-time leading scorer for both men and women, collecting 1,981 points in her 4-year career. She was a *Telegram & Gazette* and *Milford Daily News* super team selection for soccer, indoor rack, and outdoor track. Coach Walter Berkowicz maintains that her leadership and production were

invaluable traits to her teams.

As a sophomore (2011) Coach Berkowicz relied on Cahill's versatility as she led the team with her jumping, hurdling, and sprinting abilities. Emily won the Indoor State Championship at the Reggie Lewis Center in the high jump at 5'4" in 2011. After barely clipping the pole on her first jump in the competition, Emily made a slight adjustment with more arch in her back and executed the following attempt to perfection by clearing the bar at 5'4" to seal the crown.

As a junior, Cahill was undefeated in the high jump and scored 336 total points throughout the year, including a crucial 40 points for her team in the SWCL indoor championships. At the Division 4 State Indoor Track and Field Meet, she placed first in the high jump at 5'6", was runner-up in 55-meter hurdles (8.74 seconds), and anchored the 4x400 relay team to a third-place finish at 4:20.26. She continued to show her versatility and consistency during the outdoor season at the Central MA championships by

placing second in the high jump (5'6"), triple jump (35'4"), and 100-meter hurdles (15.30 seconds). She capped her junior year season with second-place finishes in high jump at the All-State Meet and New England championship with marks of 5'6" and 5'5" respectively.


As a senior, Cahill won the Indoor All-State Championships in high jump. She dominated the 2013 SWCL outdoor championships placing first in the triple jump (36'7 ³/₄"), 100 meters (12.66 sec), high jump (5'2"), 4 x 100 relay (54.25 sec), and runner-up in 200 meters (26.05 sec). She continued her dominance at the Division 2 Central \ West Championship by winning the high jump (5'4"), placing second in the 100 meters (12.71 sec), and placing 5th in the triple jump. She finished her illustrious high school track career by placing 10th in high jump at the New Balance Outdoor National Championships.



In addition to her track career, Cahill was a four-year varsity starter for the soccer team. During her senior season, she was named Captain and selected as a SWCL first-team all-star.

Emily continued her track and field career and collegiate education at the University of Pennsylvania, where she obtained her Bachelor of Science in Nursing, and then obtained her Master's Degree in Nursing from Drexel University. Today, she enjoys hiking, traveling, and rock climbing in her free time. She currently resides in Kalamazoo, Michigan with her fiancé, Paul, and three animals.

Daniel "Dig" Clarke Class of 1994




The neighborhood backyards were the classroom where Dan Clarke, known to everyone as Dig, learned his game, playing basketball and wiffleball against his older bigger brother and the older bigger neighborhood kids. He learned well. By the time he had graduated from Uxbridge High School in 1994, he was a three sport standout, had earned 10 Varsity Letters, played on five Championship teams, and was a three sport Captain.

In the fall, Dan ran varsity Cross Country for 4 years. He was a two-time captain and led his senior year squad to an 11-5 record, running first in 10 of the season's 16 dual meets. Dan took 4th in the SWCL meet and his 9th place medal in the District Meet qualified him as an individual for the state meet. He was a SWCL All-Star, a *Milford Daily News* All-Star, and a *Woonsocket Call* All-Star. He received the District E Coach's Award for Cross Country as a senior.

Winters saw Dan on the basketball court. A 6th man as a sophomore, he moved to starting point guard in his junior year, on the team that went undefeated through a SWCL Championship, a Clark Tournament Championship, and a District Championship. In the district final, Dan led the team with 27 points before fracturing a bone in his foot that prevented him from meaningful play in the State Semifinal, where Uxbridge

was finally beaten, ending the season at 23-1. In his senior year, co-captain of a 14-6 team, he moved to shooting guard and averaged 18.5 points and 5.8 assists per game, once scoring 26 points in the first half of a game. Both as a junior and as a senior, Dan was selected a SWCL All-Star, a *T&G* All-Star, a *Milford Daily News* All-Star, a *Woonsocket Call* All-Star, and a *Blackstone Tribune Advertiser* All-Star. As a senior, he was selected a first-team Academic All-State, played on the Bay State Team, and was named to the Best of 80 team.

Springtime found Dan on the baseball field, where he was a solid hitter and a deft fielder. Once his fractured foot healed, Dan played Second Base on the SWCL Champion team as a junior. In his senior year, Dan, a co-Captain, moved to shortstop on a team that got hot mid-season and won both the District Championship and the state semi-final before dropping the state final. During his graduation week, Dan was named Spartan of the Year, a recognition of his academic and athletic accomplishments. Dan graduated from Clark University Summa cum Laude and Phi Beta Kappa. He currently resides in Burlington, Vermont and teaches English at Enosburg Falls Junior High School in Enosburg, Vermont.



Mark Donahue Coach & Athletic Director



When one thinks of Uxbridge High School Boys Basketball, great memories of Southern Worcester County League contests with arch-rivals, Clark Tournament games played in an amazing environment, and the goal of post season play in District Playoffs comes to mind, as the Spartans boys' teams have always excelled. BUT one constant influence and a person synonymous to the Uxbridge Boys basketball program for over 34 years was Mark Donahue.

Mark was the boys head basketball coach at UHS from 1979 through 2013, compiling a record of 396-272 and during which his teams won five Southern Worcester County League (SWCL) titles. The longtime head coach of the Spartans joined the elite 300 win club in Jan 2007, nearly 28 years to the day he won his first varsity game at Uxbridge on Jan 16, 1979.

Coach Donahue led the Spartans to four Clark Tournament championships: during the 1981-1982, 1992-1993, 2010 -2011, and 2011-2012 seasons, including the perfect 23-0 regular season in 1992-93. His Spartan teams qualified for Central MA District basketball post-season tournament play for 27 years during his career, winning titles in Division 3 (1981-1982) and Division 2 (1992-1993).

In 1990 he coached and organized the a team tour of Czechoslovakia and the Soviet Union. Coach Donahue set a very high standard for his players that enabled his teams to exceed their expected ability resulting in many winning and successful seasons.

Not only did Mark wear the hat of physical education and health teacher in the Uxbridge Public Schools but was also the Athletic Director for 30 years heading up all varsity and sub-varsity programs as well as scheduling junior high interscholastic athletic events before his retirement. In addition, Coach Donahue was the Uxbridge Girls Cross Country Coach for 20 years (1992-2012) as his teams won 63 consecutive dual meets from 1997-1989 through 2002-2003, and he compiled an overall career record of 195-32.

Mark was instrumental in forming the UHS Athletic Hall of Fame in the early 2000's. He is a member of the MA Basketball Coaches Assoc (MBCA) which he was named Coach of the Year three times (1982, 1993, and 2007) as well as the recipient of the MBCA Leo Miller Award for Outstanding contribution to High School Basketball in Massachusetts. Donahue is also past president of the MBCA and was inducted into the MBCA Hall of Fame in 2014. He was also inducted that same year to the New England Basketball Hall of Fame. Mark served as the coaches' representative to the MIAA Basketball Tournament committee for several years and continues as a member of the Clark University Basketball Tournament Committee which he served as past president.

Mark is just the third coach inducted into the UHS Athletic Hall of Fame with a coaching career that spans over four decades. He resides in Sutton MA with his wife Judy of 44 years. He has three children, Dan, Christina, and Mary, as well as five grandchildren.



A former athlete of St Peter's in Worcester, where he played both basketball and baseball, Mark is a 1977 graduate of Bridgewater State College and played college basketball for four seasons. Upon retiring from UHS in 2013, he was named Athletic Director of the Year by the Massachusetts Athletic Directors' Association.

Meghan Gaskell Creighton Class of 2002



During the late 1990's and early 2000's, Uxbridge High School softball recorded a winning percentage of 85% spanning ten years. However, four record-setting years from 1999 to 2002 were never more dominant than under the pitching prowess of Meghan Gaskell Creighton as she compiled a record of 61-19 on the mound.

A rare four year varsity player in three sports, including field hockey, basketball, and softball, Meghan was a three-time MVP for Coach Joe McCourt's softball team. The crafty pitcher holds the school record for career strikeouts (725) as her team compiled a 23-1 record her senior year. She amassed 224 strikeouts in a single season (2000-01) and she holds the school record for 61 varsity career wins on the mound. Meghan also holds the school record for most wins by a pitcher in a single season with 19 mound victories (2001-02).

In addition, Meghan hurled four perfect games during her illustrious high school career, with her first against Quaboag during her junior season followed by three more perfect gems during an amazing senior season. Her 207 strikeouts as a senior ranks second all-time only to her junior year's mark. All total, during her four years on the

Spartan mound, she ranks first All Time with 12 pitching shut outs in a season (1998-99). Her 26 shutouts in a varsity career is second-best all-time.

Also a feared hitter at the plate, Meghan ranks 4th All Time with 113 hits in her varsity career (113 for 293), with a career batting average of .375. She led her team in various batting categories throughout each season during her career, including hits, doubles, and RBI.

In addition to her excellence on the softball field, the versatile athlete was a two-time MVP for Coach Dean Tourangeau's basketball team on the hardwood. The senior captain was a two time SWCL East All Star selection as well as recognized with the prestigious MA Academic Athletic Top 80 Award during her senior campaign.

As a varsity field hockey player, she led her team to multiple SWCL titles as well as registering 26 goals and 15 assists during her four years, which included a Division 2 District Championship during her sophomore season. Meghan was the recipient of the Sportsmanship Award during her senior year as well as being recognized with both SWCL East All Star and *T&G* All Star team honors.

The multi talented student athlete was a four-time SWCL East All Star in Softball, unanimously chosen twice, and Athlete of the Week numerous times as named by the *Blackstone Valley Tribune* and *Milford Daily News* over the course of her storied softball career. Meghan was awarded both Spartanette of the Year and Spartanette Athlete of the Year in 2001-02.

Gaskell-Creighton graduated from Babson College in 2006 where she was inducted into the Babson Athletic Hall of Fame in 2015. She was a four year starter for the Beaver softball team earning 2nd-team All American distinction in 2006. In addition, she was presented with the Babson Scholar Athlete Award her senior year as well as New England Women's and Men's Athletic Conference (NEWMAC) Pitcher of the Year, NEWMAC Athlete of the Year, and League MVP during her senior year. In August 2023, Meghan was one of 30 student athletes recognized for the last 25 years to

be named to the NEWMAC 25th Year Anniversary Team as the all time leader in seven different pitching categories, and she remains first in winning percentage, victories, and strikeouts.

She resides in Uxbridge with her husband Bradley and their two children, Makenna and Trevor.

Kristen Lane Martin Class of 1996



The 1995-96 Uxbridge Field Hockey field hockey team was labeled by an area newspaper as "walk softly and carry a big stick" thanks to the outstanding performance of Kristen Lane Martin. She was a major contributor for four years in field hockey, basketball, and softball at Uxbridge High School in the mid 1990's. Considered a total team player, Kristen exhibited Spartan qualities of leadership that earned the respect of peers, coaches, and opponents.

A dynamic field hockey star with a natural knack for scoring goals, Kristen amassed 64 career goals, which was a school record not broken for 30 years. This scoring mark ranks 2nd all-time in the Spartan record books. Her record breaking 28th goal (previously held by Susan Campo Weiss, herself a Hall of Famer, Class of 1987) was scored in dramatic fashion with just 21 seconds remaining in her junior year season finale game. Kristen also recorded 17 assists during her varsity career.

Affectionately referred to as "Express Lane" on the field, Kristen ranks first with most goals in a game (shared with Campo Weiss), tallying six versus Leicester her sophomore year (1993-94). She also ranks 6th all-time, recording 28 goals during her senior campaign (1995 -96).

She was recognized as three-time First Team SWCL all star in field hockey in addition to Central MA All Star, *Telegram & Gazette* Super Team All Star, *Milford Daily News* All-Star and Woonsocket Call All-Star. Kristen was a participant in the Central MA Bay State Games as well as USA Field Hockey Futures. She played in the Cape Cod Classic team in 1995 as well as participated in the Best of 60 Senior All Star Game, USA Field Hockey Festival held in Palm Springs, California, and Senior High School Showcase team at Yale University.

Kristen is also recognized in the Uxbridge High Athletic record books for her pitching career on the softball team.

During her four years, the softball team went 55-13 under Hall of Fame Coach Joe Mahoney, with three league titles, one district title, two district semifinals and one state final appearance.

As a pitcher Kristen ranks 6th all-time with most wins in a season (16) during her junior season with a record of 16-3 amassing 28 victories during her illustrious varsity career (6th all time) with a mark of 28-4. She was named to both *Milford Daily News* and *Woonsocket Call* All Star teams for 2 consecutive years.

She pitched 4 no-hit games in her softball career, with one perfect game versus Sutton her junior year. In that game, she also collected 2 singles and a double with 2 RBI at the plate.

She was named the Spartanette Athlete of the Year her senior year as well as earning the Coaches Award in Field Hockey. Kristen was a member of the National Honor Society for three years at UHS and was President her senior year as well as being a member of the Student Council, Local Student Advisory Council, and Yearbook Committee at UHS.

Kristen went on to play Division I field hockey earning an athletic scholarship at Providence College where she starred at midfield and forward, earning Big East Academic All Star status for three consecutive years. The Lady Friars were Big East Champion Runner up her freshman year. She achieved PC Athletic Director's Honor Roll and Dean's List graduating Magna Cum Laude with a

Bachelor of Elementary and Special Education and later earning her Master's Degree of Education from Boston College.

Kristen has been teaching in the Grafton School System for 20 years. She resides in Uxbridge with her husband Brian and their children Tyler (age 12) and Harrison (age 9). Kristen enjoys traveling around New England watching her own children play ice hockey, lacrosse, and baseball.

Jeff Parcells Class of 1992



In the game of football, a formidable rushing attack is key to the success of a team, and this coupled with opportunistic special teams in kick returns generally results and produces Championships. Uxbridge High School was fortunate to have Jeff Parcells spearhead its powerful running attack as well as kick returns from 1988 to 1991, as the Spartans won their first Central Massachusetts Super Bowl on December 7,1991.

The game was played at Donatelli Field in Uxbridge as it was rescheduled from Worcester Polytechnic Institute (WPI) as the artificial turf could not be cleared of the ice and snow that fell from the day earlier. Uxbridge players, coaches, fans, and even Superintendent of Schools Michael Ronan, shoveled the field and found it in good shape, so MIAA officials decided to play the game in Uxbridge.

As a four-year starter for the varsity football squad, Jeff was co-captain of the 1991-92 team which won the Central MA Division 3 Super Bowl title with a 21-0 victory over Bay Path. Jeff rushed for 142 yards on 23 carries with one TD in the win that capped an 11-1 season record (the only loss was to Maynard by a score of 7-3). Also during the 1991-92 season, Uxbridge snapped a 24 year losing streak to rival Northbridge, and Parcells was a key component to the victory.

The talented running back ranks in the top three categories for several school records in points, TD's rushing, and total yards combined for rushing, kick off returns and receptions. Jeff is listed in the UHS record books with 126 points scored in a season (2nd all time) and 20 TD's in a season (2nd all time). For his career, his 34 touchdowns rank second all-time.

His career highlights include a 90 yard kickoff return versus Leicester during the 1990-91 season. He also had an 80 yard run from scrimmage against Leicester during the 1991-92 season.

During his junior year, Jeff impressed spectators with 160 yards rushing on 17 carries while scoring two touchdowns for Coach Steve Knowlton's squad that defeated a very talented Grafton team. In fact, Jeff thwarted a Grafton drive with an interception in the final seconds of the game to secure the victory.

Jeff also collected 280 total all-purpose yards against North Smithfield on Thanksgiving Day during the 1991-92 season, rushing for 212 yards on just 8 carries and 68 yards pass receiving in which he scored three touchdowns.

The 6 foot tall-175 pound featured senior back of Coach Ernie Richards' squad rushed for 167 yards versus Worcester Vocational in a game played during the 1991-92 season that culminated in his total rushing mark of 1144 yards in the season. Having had mono

his senior campaign, he actually played the equivalent of eight games and finished his career with an average of 8.0 yards per carry.

In addition to his 2084 career rushing yards at Uxbridge, the talented gridiron athlete ranks third in school history for most varsity football points in a career with 201 points. Jeff was named to various First Team All Star teams for three consecutive years and was awarded the Spartan Male Athlete of the Year in 1992.

Through his hard work and dedication to the sport of football, Jeff received a full athletic scholarship to play football at Murray State University in Kentucky. He played and lettered there as a freshman and had his playing career cut short due to a back injury. Jeff then went on to become the head football coach at his alma mater from 1999 – 2004 compiling a record of 43-23. In addition, he was the former head football coach at Leicester High School and Oxford High School. In his roles at Sutton High School, where he served as a school counselor for nine years and athletic director for four, he was instrumental in starting their varsity football program. Jeff is a graduate of Worcester State University with a Bachelors of Science in Sociology and a



graduate of Cambridge College with a Master's Degree in Education in Counseling Psychology. He is currently the Director of Athletics at Medway High School.

Kelly Rosborough Class of 1996



As for a role model for the student athlete at Uxbridge High School, one needs not look any further than the early to mid 1990's. Kelly Rosborough was and continues to be a role model for all Spartan athletes with her commitment to excellence as she was a three-sport athlete, starring in field hockey, basketball, and softball. High School summers were spent grinding on the field and courts participating in leagues, tournaments, and camps to further her skills in each respective sport.

Field hockey was her strongest sport, as she went on to play collegiately at the University of Connecticut after earning multiple conference All Star selections as well as serving as team captain. Kelly was a hard working midfielder who always managed to keep the ball in the opponent's end and was highly regarded as a two-way field hockey standout for the Spartans. Her Uxbridge teams record during her stellar varsity career (1993-1995) under Coach Susan Burgess tallied 39-12-5 as the Spartans were SWCL champions her junior and senior year. In

addition, Kelly led her team to district playoffs all three years, only being defeated by Quaboag in the Div 2 Semifinals her senior year while enduring a heartbreaking double overtime loss to Quabbin her junior year in the quarterfinal. Kelly's senior year stats of 10 goals and 5 assists earned her all star status for the Best of 60 Senior All Stars, as well as Woonsocket Call, Milford Daily News and T&G selections. She was also the SWCL all star and District E Award winner. Outside of Uxbridge field hockey, Kelly was selected to the 1994 Bay State Games and Cape Cod Classic team. In addition, she participated in the USA Field Hockey Futures program.

In basketball under head coach Dean Tourangeau, she was a fierce 5'4" defender who approached the game with tenacity and intensity, regardless of the opponent. Coach Tourangeau's game plan was to put Kelly on the best player of the opposing team no matter the size . The three-year varsity small forward (playing the 3 or 4 position) led her team to a 14-5 record her senior year.

As a three-year varsity softball player manning second base for Coach Joe Mahoney, her teams compiled a record of 48-8. Kelly was captain of the softball squad her senior year as well as being a member of the National Honor Society and Student Council at Uxbridge High.

Kelly continued her collegiate field hockey career at the University of Connecticut under legendary head coach Nancy Stevens. She earned an athletic scholarship as a red shirt her freshman year. A 4 year starter at the center back position, Kelly helped lead the Huskies to 4 Big East Conference Regular Season Crowns, Two Big East Tournament Championships, 1 NCAA Tournament Quarterfinals, and 2 NCAA Final Four appearances.

Kelly is a lifelong Uxbridge resident, the oldest of three children to Russell

and Brenda Rosborough. She resides at home with her daughter, Ava, age 13. She is currently the head coach of the two-time defending state champion field hockey team at Uxbridge High School. Prior to leading UHS' team, Kelly started her coaching career as the head coach at Worcester Academy (2006-2008). Kelly, a Special Education teacher in Sutton since 2013, holds a Bachelors in Art and Master Degrees in Special Education with a specialty in Autism and Behavior Analysis.

Steven Saulen Class of 2004



Playing high school sports back to back during football and basketball season for four consecutive years is not an easy task. Six straight months of practices and games giving 110% each day while maintaining academic excellence is not quite simple for a teenager. Steve Saulen made sure his presence on the grass playing field and hardwood court would never leave any one in doubt as to his dedication and intensity of how he played the game during his illustrious high school career at Uxbridge High School.

Steve was a standout athlete excelling in both football and basketball as he captained both squads his senior year.

In football, he was a two-way standout at both tight end and defensive end. Steve is in the record books at UHS for a number of receiving categories as well as being an outstanding blocker from the Tight End position. Defensively he was an impact player beginning his freshman year. He could defend the run and pass equally well, and although there are no defensive stats on record, he would most likely be a top ten performer in both sacks and tackles for loss.

The sure-handed football receiver ranks first All Time on the UHS record list with 12 receiving TD's in a season (11 games during the 2002-03 season), while his 18 varsity career receiving TD's ranks second-best all time. Named


both a *Worcester Telegram and Gazette* All-Star as well as a *Milford Daily News* all-star, he ranks eighth all-time in the UHS record books with 30 single-season receptions (most receptions in a season) during his senior year, averaging 200-yards per season.

In basketball, Steve was a prolific power forward varsity starter for 3 years, leading his team to post-season tournament appearances each year. Steve ended his career scoring 1155 points following his senior season, which still ranks third all-time at Uxbridge. He ranks in the top in several record book categories, from his 373 points in 19 games as a junior to individual game performances of 39 (2nd all-time) and 35 (7th all-time), against Oxford and Auburn respectively. The three time co-captain was a physical presence as a rebounder on both the offensive and defensive sides, being named to various First-Team All Star teams and was awarded the Coaches Award as well as Spartan of the Year his senior year.

Both basketball and football Coaches Mark Donahue and Dan Deveau Jr consider Steve an outstanding leader and well respected by his coaches and teammates in both sports.

Steve accepted a full scholarship at Colgate University where he went on to perform and play football for the Raiders. He is employed as Director of Manufacturing at Tiffany and Co. and resides in Sutton with his wife Amy and their 3 children, Luke (10), Colton (3), and Josephine (2).

Chris Shaw Class of 1993



Chris Shaw had an unbelievable run in football and basketball during the 1992-93 school year at Uxbridge High.

Chris was one of the captains for the UHS Super Bowl Football Championship team that went 11–0. Playing tight end and linebacker, Shaw and his Spartan teammates rolled to an undefeated record, capping the season with their second straight Super Bowl victory over Bay Path. The 11–0 unbeaten record was the school's first since 1949.

What followed in basketball were 23 more victories before finally losing in the state semifinals to Wahconah.

That's a total of playing in 34 straight games in football and basketball without a loss. In fact, Chris' football teams lost only three varsity football games in his three year career!

The 6-foot-2, 175-pound Shaw played significant roles in all those successes as well as an 11-1 record in football his junior year that won a Super Bowl.

Those achievements tally two straight Super Bowl titles in football and three championships in basketball including the SWCL title, the Clark tourney crown, and the Central Mass. district championship.

During his senior year in football, Shaw caught 14 passes and 11 of them went for touchdowns. On defense, he led the Spartans in tackles (90), sacks (6) and interceptions (5).


Shaw had some big moments, too. He had two touchdowns against Worcester North, a punt return for a TD and a reception for a TD against West Boylston, two TDs against David Prouty, and a pair of 62-yard TD receptions against Grafton and North Smithfield. In fact, he played one game against Oxford with walking pneumonia as he scored an 18-yard touchdown on an end-around play and figured in a dozen tackles.

Chris shares the school record for most passes intercepted and run back for a touchdown in a varsity career with three. In

addition, he holds the school record for the highest average per reception in a season with 24.3 yards during the 1992-93 season (15 catches for 365 yards).

Shaw was also a co-captain in basketball who could shoot jumpers, 3-pointers and drive to the hoop. He also defended the opponents' top-scoring forwards. He had a memorable game against rival Northbridge as a junior as he connected on four straight 3-pointers while tallying 29 points as the Spartans dropped a one-point decision. On the basketball court, the guard-forward averaged a double double as a senior.

Chris even played a varsity season of tennis as a senior. With no lessons or any formal training, Shaw played third singles and managed six victories. Shaw was a SWCL all-star in both football and basketball and was also chosen for First Team All-Star honors in both sports by three newspapers. Chris was named Spartan Male Athlete of the Year in 1993.



He is currently employed as a Property Manager for Carruth Capital LLC in Westborough MA. Chris is married to his wife Jillian for nine years and are proud parents to two daughters, Margaret and Grace, while still residing in Uxbridge.

Boys Basketball 1981-82 Team



The team credited with inspiring a new tradition of excellence at Uxbridge High School, the 1981-82 boys basketball team won the first district championship in school history. They finished with a record of 18-5. Led by head Coach Mark Donahue and Assistant Coach Dean Tourangeau, this will be the first group inducted in the "team category" to the UHS Athletic Hall of Fame.

Prior to 1981-82, Uxbridge High had not won any athletic championships, in any sport, since the mid-1960s. Many great championship teams came about in the next four decades. However, it was the accomplishments of the 1981-82 UHS basketball team that set the table for the great success in athletics that was to follow and continues today. The team took the town by storm, playing in front of packed houses at home and on the road, as well as the college venues of Clark University and Holy Cross College.

Team members include Ray Chapman (Captain), Mike Bertrand, Greg Clark, Bob Frabotta, Kevin Kearnan, Keith Kearnan, Dave Loos, Rich Menard, Keith Menchin, Bryan Preston, Dave Silbor, Mark Stanovich and Mike Grant (Manager).


After a great regular season in a highly competitive Southern Worcester County league, Uxbridge went on to capture the "Daily Double," the two biggest prizes in Central Mass Basketball - The Clark Tournament and District titles.

The 1982 Small School Clark Tourney title was achieved in improbable fashion as the team snapped a 37 year Clark drought. The Spartans needed to win its first round game in the Clark Tourney in order to qualify for the District playoffs. A dramatic 61-60 victory over Leicester in the first round was capped by a baseline jumper at the buzzer by junior Keith Kearnan to tie the game in regulation followed by another buzzer beater shot by Mark Stanovich to win in overtime. Uxbridge defeated Quabbin Regional High School in the semi finals (50-48) on another game winning shot by Kearnan as the final horn sounded. and they defeated Hopedale High School (47-37) to win the championship marking the first Clark title for Uxbridge High since 1945.

Following the Clark Tournament, Uxbridge moved on to the District Championship playoffs, defeating Nipmuc in the first round. It was then on to Holy Cross where were the Spartans down 12 points entering the fourth quarter, rallied, and defeated previously unbeaten Keefe Tech Regional in the semi-finals by a score of 51-50 paced by Bob Frabotta's 17 points. It was another patented "barn burner" victory that led many in the media to identify the team as the "Cardiac Kids."

In the Championship game, Uxbridge faced Hopedale once again in a final round matchup. They completing the season with a victory as sophomore Greg Clark guided a talented cast of teammates scoring 18 points as the Spartans were crowned Champions of Central Mass. Unfortunately, no state championship was conducted that year. Instrumental to the team throughout the regular season and playoffs was the inside scoring and rebounding presence of Keith Menchin, the always steady play of top defender Ray Chapman and the sharpshooting from long range by Bryan Preston.

The accomplishments of the 1981-82 basketball team ushered in the beginning of the great success of athletics for future Uxbridge High teams. It was not only their great achievements on the court, but also off the court it sparked a rekindled interest in athletics that fueled the many championships that continue to be reflected in the rich tradition at UHS.






